The Great Three Days

Very soon we will be embarking on the most sacred liturgical journey that a Christian makes: the Great Three Days of Holy Week, a.k.a. the Triduum. (By the way, Triduum is a fun word to drop at parties, makes you sound smart. It means three days of prayer.) Anyway, I am of course talking about Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, and the Great Vigil of Easter. In these liturgies we embark on experiential learning, basically we learn by doing. Liturgically we do as Jesus did, washing feet on Maundy Thursday as we remember Jesus' new commandment that we love one another. Like Jesus praying for the whole world in the garden even as he faces his own torture and death, we pray the solemn collects on Good Friday. Then we wait with solemn expectation for the resurrection, remembering the salvation history in the Great Vigil of Easter.

If you've never attended these services before, I highly recommend it. They are some of the most spiritually moving and transformative rites we do. The schedule is on the cover, and we hope to see you there.

In the Christian faith we believe that while death is **an** ending it is also **a** beginning. As with all transitions it is best to plan ahead. Furthermore, the arrangements we make for the end of our mortal life are a final testament to our beliefs and our faith. Lastly, planning ahead is an invaluable gift to those that survive us. I've sat with families where the loved one had everything planned. Consequently, the family was not required to make a host of decisions in the midst of their grief; rather, they could simply grieve. Conversely, I've sat with families that did not have anything planned and the extra burden of decision making while everyone was hurting landed upon them.

Spiritually Speaking Interior Visualization Practice

"God is Light" (1 John 1:3); "the glory of the Lord shone around them (Luke 2:9); "[Jesus] is the light of the world" (John 8:12); "his face and clothes were radiant" (Matt 17:2); "you are the light of the world" (Matt.5:14); "walk as children of light" (Eph. 5:8); "the eye is the lamp of the body" (Matt. 6:12).

We will be using light as our visualization this month, so very appropriate for April. Close your eyes and imagine a bright white star of light emerge from the middle of your forehead, allowing the light to become still and three-dimensional. If this is hard for you to do, simply sense there is a light before you so you can feel its warmth. Let this imagined light stand for the light of Christ, a light that softly absorbs your thoughts so you can be still. The longer you are still, the more still the light will become. Rest in the still light and be present to God. The chant, "Light of Christ" is often played at Easter Vigil. This can be an opportunity to visualize this glorious light!

Let this light be a call for God's light that is in Christ to be realized in you. You can extend this practice by letting the light expand throughout your body, around your body and out into the universe! Breathe in and out!

Summary of Vestry Meeting on March 8th, 2023

The Vestry meeting started with Father Jason saying an opening prayer.

Father Jason expressed appreciation and deep gratitude for the support he and his family received from the St. Pat's congregation over the tragic death of his sister-in-law. He thanked Peter O'Neill and the Tuesday morning men's group for holding a successful Shrove Tuesday Pancake event and Bill Eddy and his team for a well-attended and successful Fish Fry event. Father Jason also noted that attendance at the Ash Wednesday services and Ashes to go session was notable despite inclement weather.

Senior Warden, Ed Yuhas, presented the need for a review of St Patrick's bylaws and a small committee was formed to work with him. He also mentioned looking into job descriptions and performance management for staff members.

Roy Barker, Junior Warden, stated that there were no new issues to report over the past month.

Other items discussed included services and events planned for Holy week; resumption of Endowment Committee meetings, formation of an ad hoc committee to review St. Pat's property insurance and monthly finances. A task force comprising of Bill Righter, Bill Eddy, Stacy Craig, Amy O'Neill, Charlie Horton, and Father Jason to review the structure and handling of finance and accounting was established. The progress of the Strategic Planning Committee at the meeting on March 4, 2023 and development of the 3-year strategic targets were discussed as well as 12-month milestones.

Bill Righter, Treasurer, noted that revenue for February was \$5,400 under budget, and operating pledges \$6,500 under budget or the month. He highlighted that the year-to-date revenue is \$6,600 over budget whilst the year-to-date expenses are \$11,000 under budget. The vestry approved the treasurer's report and the minutes of the February meeting.

Now is the time to start (or continue) collecting any nice, gently-used items you would like to donate to the sale. Please also collect grocery-style paper bags for use in the sale. Note that, as in past sales, there are some items we won't be taking: larger furniture requiring two people to move (e.g., no armoires, large entertainment centers, sofas, or love seats), old tube-style TVs (newer LCD TVs can definitely be donated), and used mattresses. The items you donate to the sale are used in two possible ways: they may go directly to one of the outreach organizations the church works with, or more often they are sold in the sale to fund projects around the church that benefit the congregation. With the Spring and Fall sales, we hope to raise enough to replace an HVAC unit.

As always, we will need lots and lots of help for the sale. Sign-up sheets will be available in Smith Hall starting in early April on a table to the right as you enter (You may also contact Mark Hanes via email to "sign-up"). We need helpers for setup, item pickups, organizing, pricing, cleanup, and help both days of the sale. We also need volunteers to bring lunch items each day to help feed the volunteers!

Whither St. Patrick's?

It occurred to me the other day that I have been a member of this church family for over 40 years! When I arrived in May, 1982, I first visited St. John's in Worthington and was told about a new group in Dublin. I promptly forgot about this as I settled into my new job.

My family arrived a month later and asked me about church. We visited the first St. Pat's (although it did not yet have a name) at the Dublin Community Church one Sunday afternoon. We doubled the congregation!

In those years there was a large influx of new folks to Dublin. We quickly started adding a family a week, settled on the St. Patrick's name, and asked Don Peterson to come and build a church with us. Chris Cline was instrumental in getting the first work done and welcoming each new congregant.

Near year end, Don asked me to become the first Senior Warden and John Stains the Junior Warden. My wife was Don's assistant and Church Secretary. We changed our venue to the Kennedy Room at the church. It held about 65 persons and we quickly filled it. We then moved to the middle school across the street. That Easter, 1985, we had over 300 people at the Easter Service and it was clear we needed our own space.

Dick Walker had done a lot of real estate development law and knew the growth pattern for Dublin. He was instrumental in our choice of property, the present St. Patrick's. At the time it was in the middle of a soybean field. Sure enough, development was right around the corner. We started worship in today's Parish Hall and then eventually built and moved into the current Sanctuary.

All of this may be more history than you want. Believe me, there is much more but that is not the main point of this article. The real point is that over these 40 years, we as a community have developed and supported over 40 different kinds of ministry! We work in the community, we work with those less fortunate, we work with those in need, and we work to educate ourselves to be able to do even more.

My time as a leader at St. Pat's is over. A new generation is now responsible for continuing our ministry, and that is a healthy thing. My hope in writing this is to convince you in joining with me to help the work continue after we're gone.

Since it is unlikely I will be here another 40 years, in my will I have a bequest to St. Patrick's Endowment Fund. Our endowment is different from many in that it is solely for Education and Outreach. It cannot be used for the building, for the worship wrappings, or for paving the parking lot, although these are all worthy uses of money. The endowment specifically helps insure that the ministries can continue and can grow in scope. Please consider making a similar bequest if you are able, or simply make an annual gift and mark it for the endowment. Join with me in helping the endowment become a meaningful contributor to our future.

Wellness Words

Ah, Spring! "When young man's thoughts likely turn to thoughts of love" REALLY? Mine turn to thoughts of hot cross buns, chocolate bunnies, Easter egg hunts, lots of choir practice for the Easter services and, oh yes, an increase in the pollen count as the flowers begin to bloom.

Anyway, the thought of hot cross buns and having guests over had me thinking about how to make some safe and delicious choices for people who are "gluten free." It seems that there are more and more people who are going "gluten free." Is this a fad or is it a real thing? So, I started to do some digging about it to sort out some of the facts and myths surrounding this diet.

First, this is <u>not</u> a fad. Celiac disease occurs in about 1 percent of the American population, and about 6 per cent of the population have what is called "non celiac gluten sensitivity," or NCGS. People who have celiac disease have a genetic condition (the HLA DQ2 and DQ8) that predisposes the person to have this condition. It is an autoimmune disease. People who have NCGS don't have the genes and their condition is not in the autoimmune category. There is no test for NGCS, but there is a blood test for celiac disease. This can differentiate the diagnosis. The experts really don't know the cause of NCGS.

Symptoms of both conditions are similar- bloating, constipation or diarrhea, fatigue, increased flatulence (read gas), and stomach pain ②. In order to figure out the real diagnosis, blood work to detect the genes and an elimination diet is usually helpful. The Johns Hopkins website can be helpful- look up the FODMAP diet.

What are some myths about gluten?

It's bad for you- NO! it's a naturally occurring substance found in grains like barley and rye and provide needed fiber, vitamins and minerals in the diet. There are gluten free grains like buckwheat, rice, quinoa, sorghum, and oats.

Be sure to check labels! Gluten is often used as a binding agent in processed foods.

Gluten is the same as carbohydrates No! Rice, potatoes, and beans don't contain gluten and are carbs. Don't be fooled, a gluten free diet is NOT healthier <u>IF</u> you don't have celiac disease or NCGS. It's not a good weight loss diet.

Gluten free foods are healthier NO! Many of the processed "gluten free" labeled foods have high sugar, sodium, and fat to make them tastier. Avoid them if you don't need them.

There's lots of other good advice about the gluten issue. (https://hopkinsmedicine.org/health.)

Remember that being gluten free is necessary if you have celiac disease or confirmed NGCS. It's not a weight loss plan or healthier than a balanced diet. If you have symptoms, check with your provider for diagnosis. Be kind and ask the people you are inviting for a meal if they are gluten free. It's easy to prepare meals that make everyone happy.

Sacred Circle 2: Meets 2 times a month on Sunday at 11:00 a.m. Leaders: Tawnya Lewis & Kim Nelson


Sacred Circle 3: Meets the 3rd Tuesday of the month at 1:00 p.m. Leaders: Beth Landers & Lissa Barker
