Vestry and Convention Delegate Nomination Process Underway

It's that time of year again when we begin the process to select a new slate of candidates to replace the expiring terms of both Vestry (Alex Carter, Dick Gehman, and John Russo) as well as our Convention Delegates (Mike and Mary Kennedy, Kim Nelson, and alternate Lisa Palchick). All terms expire in February, 2024 at the Annual Meeting. Vestry terms are three years; Convention Delegates are two years.

Consistent with St. Patrick's by-laws, the Nominating Committee is comprised of the Senior Warden, the three retiring Vestry Members, as well as two individuals from the congregation. Over the next month the committee will begin their work to identify members of the congregation for these roles. Outreach to the candidates will begin in November with the intent that the slate is finalized by mid-December, so each candidate can author a bio that will be placed in the January *Breastplate*. Ballots will be available in January in the narthex or can be mailed by request for voting in advance of the meeting.

If you know someone in the congregation whom you believe would make a strong Vestry member or a Convention Delegate, or if you are interested yourself, please let anyone on the nominating committee know.

Finally, if you are invited to run for one of these positions, I would ask for your careful consideration of the opportunity. St. Patrick's depends not only the strength of our clergy and staff, but strong lay leadership as well to fulfill our mission.

The Dublin Food Pantry Has Moved!

On October 11, the Dublin Food Pantry began operations at their new location, 6608 Dublin Center Dr. It's next door to Germain Honda, just off Sawmill Rd.

The new DFP has returned to its original format as a "choice pantry" where clients do their own shopping.

Our food donations to the pantry are still needed to serve an ever-expanding number of clients, so please remember the DFP when you grocery shop and then leave your donations in the red wagon in the breezeway. Volunteers continue to be needed at the DFP, and you can access their website at dublin-foodpantry.org to review the positions that need to be filled and sign up.

CATCH-Freedom Ministry

One of the most exciting happenings in this Ministry is witnessing a CATCH COURT graduation. This year's September ceremony included 16 graduates, up from 11 last year, who have completed the rigorous program. These survivors made a commitment to learn coping skills to overcome the addiction, abuse, and pain of their former lifestyle and make healthier choices to become self-sufficient, contributing members of our community. Each woman is a miracle!

C.A.T.C.H was an acronym standing for Changing Actions to Change Habits. The recently updated letters now stand for Creating Autonomy Through Collaborative Healing. We continue to support this special Court Docket program through the Volunteer Program of the non-profit Freedom a la Cart. This year we have provided lunch for the women on the 3rd Thursday of the month, January through October at Court where they meet regularly with Judge Jodie Thompson, who heads the program. We support these woman also by offering needed items from our two garage sales, by a monetary donation from the Shrove Tuesday Pancake dinner, by a member volunteering in the Freedom kitchen, and by ordering box lunches from the catering division of Freedom a la Cart. We anticipate donating, as last year, winter coats and boots, and hats and scarves hand knit by some of our members. We also have a trained Mentor ready for an assignment and a couple others interested in becoming a GED Mentor.

If you want to make a difference in the life of a survivor of human trafficking, consider registering for the next Volunteer + Mentor Training November 28th. This seminar provides abundant information; you do not have to commit to becoming a Volunteer or a Mentor to attend. Register at www.freedomalacart.org. "She Has A Name" is another non-profit organization that offers training to educate and fight human trafficking and its many issues. Their next training is Nov. 1st for a virtual webinar and Nov. 8th for an in-person class at St. Mark's Episcopal Church. Register at www.shan.org. Human trafficking is a huge problem in our Columbus community and it is important to be informed.

We're offering the congregation an opportunity to share your many blessings by supporting these survivors. We have committed again this year to donate 100 Kroger \$25 gift cards for Holiday Bags for the women of CATCH and the graduate Butterfly program. Watch for the poster and collection box in the narthex. Collection dates are Nov. 12 - 26. Also, Freedom a la Cart will be selling Cause Cookies again this year. Philadelphia 11 Documentary

In 1974, a group of 11 women and their supporters organized their ordination to become Episcopal priests in an act of civil disobedience. This story is told in a compelling new documentary *The Philadelphia Eleven*.

The feature documentary film will screen here in Columbus on November 8! The screening will take place at Phoenix Theatres at Lennox Town Center at 7:00 PM. The screening is free and open to the public, but we do need a headcount so that we can upgrade to a larger screening room if we need to. Please use this form to register for the screening.

This film tells a story that echoes today as women continue this fight for the pulpit. It explores the lives of these remarkable women who succeeded in transforming an age-old institution when they took a stand despite the threats to their personal safety and the risk of rejection by the church they loved. These women are an inspiration for a generation of women in the ministry, and a clarion call for the entire Christian Church.

The Reverend Nancy H. Wittig is one of the Philadelphia Eleven featured in the movie. "It's amazing that women are still fighting for rights in the church, and continuing to feel blowback, similar to what we experienced 49 years ago," she reflected, and then went on to comment, "we are proud of the changes we have accomplished through our priesthood and the ordinations in Philadelphia."

The film's director, Margo Guernsey, is not Episcopalian. She reminds us "this is a story for all of us. It is about how to break down barriers with grace and be true to oneself in the process. This story reveals ways in which voices that are inconvenient, are often buried. It also provides a vision for what a just and inclusive community looks like in practice."

Spiritually Speaking

The Spirituality of Romans 8

Who will separate us from the love of Christ? Will affliction or distress or persecution or famine or nakedness or peril or sword? As it is written,

"For your sake we are being killed all day long; we are accounted as sheep to be slaughtered."

No, in all these things we are more than victorious through him who loved us. For I am convinced that neither death, nor life, nor angels, nor rulers, nor things present, nor things to come, nor powers, nor height, nor depth, nor anything else in all creation will be able to separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord. (Rom. 8:35-39)

This has for a long time been one of my favorite Bible passages. I committed it to memory when I was in junior high, because it


was set to music in a beautiful anthem that we sang in youth choir. While this could be an endorsement for singing in the choir or having your children do the same (please talk to Jennifer Bell if you are so inclined), it is an endorsement for reading Romans 8 in its entirety when you have the time. Or, perhaps consider reading the whole letter to the Romans and not just Chapter 8— it helped to inspire St. Augustine's conversion (Rom. 13:13-14), and caused Martin Luther, who led the Protestant Reformation, to feel "reborn," who then wrote a preface to the letter that inspired John Wesley, who founded Methodism. My youth choir director chose well!

In Romans 8, Paul, the author of the letter, tells people about life in the Spirit. He tells us that the life-giving Spirit of God dwells in us, and that we are children of God (vv. 9-16.) He writes that the Spirit will help us in our weakness even when we cannot "pray as we ought" (v. 26.) And finally, Paul assures us that the suffering in this life cannot ever separate us from the love of God. Nothing can ever separate us from the love of God. God is faithful to us and remains with us in times of joy and suffering and all that is in between.

These passages in Romans might be very familiar to you, or they might be new. Perhaps you aren't familiar with the Bible at all. No matter what, my sincere hope is that Paul's words give you a deep awareness and assurance of God's presence and love for you.

Vestry Meeting Summary

The vestry meeting on October 11th was called to order by Father Jason at 7:05 on zoom. The meeting started with an opening prayer by Father Jason. The meeting then entered a presentation by Jim Bratton who is the representative of the parish for the Boy Scout Troop 299. He presented a power point showcasing the achievements and activities of the past year of the troop and the partnership between the church and troop. Troop 299 is very active, having 78 youth and 33 adults involved. This was followed by a presentation by Dan O'Neill, who is working on his Eagle project here at the church. He provided a timeline and scope of work to be done. The vestry complemented him on his presentation and approved the project.

Father Jason informed the vestry that Kati Glover has started as our Minister of Communications and is already proving to be an asset to the church team. The first Way of Love dinner was a success with an attendance of 45 people. Father Jason

Our house at 1262 Genesee in North Linden will be the home of Krishaunda Bell and her three children – Ja'Mar age 19, and Jeremiah and K'miyah, age 13. also informed the vestry that our Diocesan mission share estimate for 2024 was about \$13,000 less than in 2023. He was also very happy to share with us an early update on the pledge drive showing 43 pledges already submitted, with a total of \$196,400 committed. The pledge drive is only a third of the way to completion. Last year, we had 160 pledging units.

Ed Yuhas brought us up-to-date with the vestry nomination process. This year we not only need to elect three people to the vestry, but we also need to elect two new convention delegates and an alternate. The nomination committee is open to suggestions for potential nominees.

Roy Barker's Junior Warden report covered some of the items from the facilities report and then ranked and itemized items with estimates. The vestry approved the repair and resealing of both parking lots and the repair and painting of the exterior walls of the administrative wing of the building.

The treasurer's report was presented showing that at the end of September the revenues and pledges were still under budget by \$20,800 with the year-to-date total of \$68,900 under budget. The year-to-date expenses are \$23,400 under budget. The vestry was shown the first draft of the 2024 budget and a short discussion was held. The report was approved. The minutes of the last meeting were presented and approved.

The meeting was adjourned with a prayer at 8:44 pm.

Wellness Words

The little Ghoulies and Ghosties have made their rounds and all the Halloween decorations are 50% off. The television ads are now focusing on a the wonderful Christmas "stuff" that, by the time December rolls around- "if I have to see that ad one more time I shall be very tempted to throw something at the TV screen." Of course, if I do that, then I'll have to figure out one of those Black Friday deals that now start on November 1st. Grrrr! It seems that the wind up to "the most wonderful time of the year" is often the time when it doesn't feel like the most wonderful time of the year. There's more pressure and expense and planning and cooking and cleaning and too many football games.

WHOA! Says all of our Advent teachings! Take a breath! Only do what makes you grin (not grimace). Think about the gift that is coming to us during Christmastide. Well, that's not easy for many of us. It is especially not easy when the holidays are adding to some already tight budgets and stressful situations. Lissa was thinking about what frequently happens in health care settings during this season. Stress related illnesses increase in frequency, increased fatigue, susceptibility to viral or bacterial infections seems to rise and providers get more stressed. So, if you get sick every holiday season, think about the increased stress as a contributor. All is not Gloom and Doom and Stress City, though.

Here are some tips to help:

- If you are feeling stressed, stop and identify what is causing the most stress- then identify ways to lessen the impact of the stress. Set limits. Delegate. Seek out stress limiters. Often this means asking a friend to listen to what's going on. Sometimes, just talking about it can give insight into solutions. If you are feeling as if you want to hurt yourself or someone else, CALL 988 Suicide and Crisis Hotline.
- If you are the listener, and the person is expressing hopelessness and thoughts of hurting them self or others. Do not be afraid to ask- you will not put ideas in a person's head. If a person is feeling like hurting themselves, do not pass go get to a safe place like an emergency room right away. Don't take "I don't want to go" or "I was just kidding" or "I don't want to bother anyone" as an excuse for non-action.
- This is also a time when many people get "the Blues" Missing loved ones who are no longer with us. Being sad as families may not be able to get together to celebrate. Not being able to "do" the things that meet others' expectations". The stress to provide a "perfect" holiday. Decreased sleep effectiveness. These are all signs of "the Blues". This is the time to seek out some ways to decrease the feelings of loneliness and isolation. Talk to someone who's a great listener. A Stephen Minister can be just the person to help. All you need to do is ask at church. These visits are confidential and free.
- There are other great resources here at St. Patrick's to help chase away some of the holiday stress. One is to use the Living Compass <u>Living Well Through Advent 2023</u> book. This offers daily meditations that help with balancing Heart, Soul, Strength and Mind. We have them at church- just ask. You can also access daily emails by going to <u>www.livingcompass.org</u>. Forward Day by Day also offers daily meditations we also get them at church. These can help provide some quiet space and decrease the daily pressures. On December 16th from 10-2 at St. Patrick's, Lissa will be leading a Quiet Day that will give people a chance to take time to rejuvenate. Registration will be on Realm. Lunch is provided come join us!

The best thing to remember is Jason's tag line "God loves you more than you can possibly imagine". Take some time to soak up what that means. Put that on a stickie and paste it on the bathroom mirror. You are never alone. YOU ARE LOVED FOR WHO YOU ARE.

Troop 299

In September, Troop 299 recently held its summer Court of Honor where we recognized those Scouts who earned new merit badges and rank advancements during the summer. We awarded a total of 220 merit badges to 47 Scouts and rank advancements to 17 Scouts. Two Scouts, Akshat Shah and Nathan Ochs, earned Scouting's highest achievement, the rank of Eagle Scout.

For our monthly campout, the troop went on an overnight canoeing trip in western Ohio. The 10 mile float on the National Scenic Little Miami River started in Oregonia and ended in Morrow with

the scouts paddling under the tallest bridge in Ohio. 22 Scouts and 9 Ravens (the name of the adult patrol) participated.

Also, one of our Scouts installed a pollinator garden as his Eagle Project on the west side of the church property near the fire pit and swing set. Alex Wongchaowart's project was approved by the Vestry in August. Alex consulted with and received support from several members of the parish. Over three work days, he organized 20+ scout volunteers to help with the work.


