Lent

Wellness Words

Generally, these Wellness articles are topics with applications that have some individual appeal. When it is my turn, I usually circle around a couple of topics, try to think broadly, zone in on something, and begin writing to meet the Newsletter deadline. This month is different, a story about a Christmas gift I was not expecting.

My aunt celebrated her 98th birthday in November. In early December she fell and fractured a bone in her leg. ---to the E.R., admission to the hospital, followed by 8 weeks of rehabilitation. Because of the distance involved, I sent
prayers, notes, and cards and checked in with my cousin. My first visit came later. I found my aunt sitting in a
wheelchair, a big smile on her face. She had gotten "dressed up" and even wore a little makeup. My aunt is excited
about going home. Weight bearing exercises in physical therapy and her commitment to rehab were working well.

By chance, in another room close by, John a person I didn't know very well, was also a patient. He had had a serious stroke. He could not speak or move without assistance. By watching his facial expressions, he did seem to understand and could communicate some of his needs. His wife, Karen, who I did not know at all, was visiting. Both are facing an unknown future, --an active listening opportunity. Active listening—trying hard to listen carefully to someone and not be thinking about our response while they are still talking. I sat quietly while she told her story.

Karen expressed concerns about an unknown future and how best to communicate with doctors and staff. I talked with her about using the phrase, "Help me understand." This can get a conversation going with the doctors and others involved in her husband's care. That way planning can begin when the time is right. "Help me understand" can be helpful in many different and possibly difficult conversations as well. We did a little practicing to get comfortable with the phrase. Probably something we all should do. \bigcirc

Two very different hospital visits. Prayers will continue of course for all involved. Active listening will help the future thought and planning process. In the hectic, frantic, frightening world in which we currently live, Active listening is a skill we all should use more. As I was leaving to start the drive home, I hugged John's wife and touched John on the shoulder. I blew them a kiss from the doorway and got two smiles. A Christmas gift.

Many people are looking for an ear that will listen...He who no longer listens to his brother will soon no longer be listening to God either...One who cannot listen long and patiently will presently be talking beside the point and never really speaking to others, albeit he be not conscious of it.

Spiritually Speaking: Lenten Spiritual Practices

Ephesians 2:4-7

"but God, who is rich in mercy, out of the great love with which he loved us even when we were dead through our trespasses, made us alive together with Christ—by grace you have been saved—and raised us up with him and seated us with him in the heavenly places in Christ Jesus, so that in the ages to come he might show the immeasurable riches of his grace in kindness toward us in Christ Jesus."

By the time you read this, we will have been in the season of Lent* for at least two weeks. You might be new to this season, or maybe you've engaged with Lenten spiritual practices for decades. Perhaps you're somewhere in between, like me. Lent is overall a season of repentance and preparation for Easter and in many churches, it is a time when those who will be baptized prepare for their new life as Christians. There's lots of resources about Lent at the Episcopal Church website (https://www.episcopalchurch.org). It's not too late to start a Lenten spiritual practice, or if you've fallen away from practicing what you've chosen, to begin anew.

The author Esau McCaulley shares wisdom about Lent:

- Lent is overall about repentance, turning away from our sins and towards God. Yes, this is confronting our failures, but see the next point....
- God's grace meets us over and over again- God is "rich in mercy" and "abounding in love and faithfulness" (Ephesians 2:4, Exodus 34:6). God does not get tired of forgiving us and helping us turn away from sins the way that we might get tired of asking for help.
- Lent is not about God's anger with us for our sins- it's about a God who is for us, and with us, who saves us from our sins.
- There's no single way to observe Lent that we must follow. Lent is not a series of rules, but instead a gift of the collected wisdom of the church from its earliest times, and the practices are tools that bring us to a "closer walk with Jesus".
- We choose Lenten practices carefully- prayer, fasting, Scripture study, charitable giving, special devotions, and justice work, for example- as we are guided by the Spirit. What practice are you being called to during Lent at this stage of your life?

The grace of God is not something that we earn through our practices, nor do our practices "lessen the work of Christ." My hope is that our practices open a place in our hearts so that we might experience God's boundless grace during this Lent and know more deeply what God in Christ has done for us.

In January the Pledge Secretary sent out the 2023 year-end statements. We were soon notified that there were two checks missing from a parishioners statement. After going over our records multiple times we suspected that the checks were stolen before we ever got them. After talking with bankers and getting front and back images of those checks we knew the checks were stolen. The problem has since become larger as we have discovered four more victims for a total of over \$4000.

St. Patrick's is doing things to reduce the likelihood of having checks stolen. We have moved the Pledge Secretary's internal mailbox to the safe so we will no longer have checks and cash sitting around. We have asked our main mail delivery person to leave the mail inside the church when possible and to avoid delivering on Saturdays when people aren't there. We are also considering putting a hole in the door to deliver mail through or getting a theft-proof mailbox. We are considering allowing parishioners to give money to St. Patrick's via Zelle, but that process has not yet been approved.

You can help reduce the chances of us losing mail to thieves. Statements are sent out 3 or 4 times per year. Just by comparing those statements to your bank records we can be notified earlier of a problem rather than waiting for it to happen again. By using Realm Giving, the transfers would be done electronically and therefore, more safely. If you need help setting up a gift in Realm, go to the church's website (patsdublin.org), click on "Give" and select "Pledge Campaign" then go to the very bottom and click on the "Setting Up Gifts" button. If you need help logging on to Realm, our Parish Administrator can help, if you need help using Realm the Pledge Secretary can help. Here is a link to the instructions:

St. Patrick's Endowment Fund



As we were reminded at the annual meeting, we do have an Endowment Fund at St. Patrick's which has been in existence since 2016. Through the pandemic and after, the annual pledge drive/church budget has been more in the forefront. The Endowment Fund will stay in place basically for as long as St. Patrick's exists, so your contribution can readily impact the present and future outreach of our church. Contributions to the fund are for Education and Outreach. Though it has been growing ever so slowly through the years, contributions and investments are now to a point where distributions may happen as early as next year. Those familiar with endowment funds know that some congregants have monies earmarked for the fund in their wills, while others make annual contributions similar to their regular pledge contributions. Still others simply make occasional or one-time contributions. The giving process is reasonably simple. You can use Realm by selecting 'Endowment' as the fund you are giving to or write 'Endowment' in the memo of a check given to the church or placed in the offering plate. Please consider a contribution of any size to the St. Patrick's Endowment Fund this year to allow for perpetual impact on education and outreach at St. Patrick's.
